

Horse Blanket Game

When it comes to cold, horses that have been clipped are not as prepared for winter as they could be. By nature, hair has properties to help hold the body heat of a horse. A horse who lives outside in a pasture and is unclipped, heavy haired, can survive extremely low temperatures, but clip them off and they are as exposed as we would be without a coat, hat, and gloves. The solution is a blanket.

A clipped horse can handle a little cold. Just stalling in the barn or providing a windbreak does as much on a cool day as a sheet or light blanket. If a blanket is needed, it should fit properly. A blanket should cover from the base of the neck to a little past the tailhead. They should also come down below the underline. The neck opening should be large enough to fit around the base of the neck, but not expose the shoulder. The straps on the blanket need to be loose enough the horse can move easily, but tight enough they cannot get a hoof stuck if they decide to scratch. A horse blanket should be checked to see if it is causing any rubs on the skin and if it is, adjust the fit or try a different blanket.

For a blanket to work properly, they should be put on clean, dry horses. The blanket being put on should be clean and dry. Blankets should be routinely cleaned and checked for damage such as cuts, rips, or damaged straps. If a blanket becomes wet from sweat or precipitation, it needs to be changed. A wet blanket can do two things. First a wet blanket is cold and can make you horse feel colder than they would without one. Second, a wet blanket can promote skin and hair problems. Damp skin and hair can be rubbed easier, and the dampness provides an environment for some bacteria and fungus to grow.

The biggest problem with blankets is trying to match the right thickness with the temperature. Temperatures can change quickly. This is when blanketing becomes a game. You have to pay attention to the weather forecast and make decisions and arrangements to keep the right amount of blankets on. There will be days your horses will have too much blanket and others not enough. It is okay. Most of the time they will be hot or cold for a while but be fine once an adjustment is made.



The Extension office recommends enrolling for all projects that you are interested in, then dropping the others later.

MARKET BEEF WEIGH-IN

Market beef weigh-in will be held at the Sedgwick County Fairgrounds on Sunday, February 11th starting at 12:30 p.m.



inspection paper or official bill of sale at this time to prove ownership. If you do not weigh-in, you are not eligible to show at county fair. Remember, 4-H members are not required to attend weigh-in if they have prior commitments; however, your animal will need to be weighed-in at this time. If someone else is weighing your animals, we will need to know which animal belongs to which child AT THE TIME OF WEIGH-IN to accurately complete our paperwork. For safety reasons, we encourage all market beef exhibitors to start halter breaking your steer or heifer before weigh-in. The

weight range for county fair will be 1050-1500 lbs. for steers and 1000-1500 for heifers. Due to the Fair date changes, there will be some leeway, but it has not been finalized.

SHEEP AND GOAT WEIGH-IN

Due to Graduations the sheep and Goat weigh-in will be on Sunday, April 28th. The time has not been finalized yet.



Livestock projects that require MQA training include beef, sheep, swine, goats, rabbits, and poultry. If you haven't met this requirement by **June 5, 2024**, you will NOT be eligible to show at fair. Contact the Extension Office with any questions.






Project Requirements

Market Beef Weigh In

Market beef weigh-in is tentatively scheduled for **SATURDAY**, February 17 from 7:30 a.m. – 9:00 a.m. at the Eastern Colorado Research Station north of Akron. All market steers and market heifers MUST be weighed in on this date to be eligible to show at county fair - NO EXCEPTIONS.

Be sure to bring your brand inspection or an official bill of sale to prove ownership of your animal. The brand inspector will be onsite collecting that information. 4-H members enrolled in the market beef project will receive a postcard with more details in January.

State fair exhibitors – We will not be retinal scanning steers so you will need to collect and send DNA. Nomination procedures have not been finalized but we assume that the deadlines will be the same as always so beef nomination would be due April 1. All state fair market steers and heifers will also need a county tag.

Save the Dates: Livestock, Horse, and Dog Weigh Ins/ID Deadlines

Horse and Dog identification is due in 4Honline by May 1st. Swine identification is due Monday, May 1. Sheep and Goat weigh in has been tentatively set for Monday, May 6 from 3:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. at the fairgrounds. Our annual Meat Quality Assurance training will take place at the Events Center on April 15th. More details about all of these events and deadlines will be sent out this spring.

Livestock Record Book Change

4-H livestock projects will not be using the state e-record for this coming year. A county record book is being finalized and will be rolled out after the first of the year. While the book may look different, many of the core principles of record keeping will remain the same. The book will be available through our office or via email. This will only affect livestock projects! Livestock record books are due on the Tuesday prior to county fair (July 16) by 4:30 p.m. in the Extension Office.

Beef Weigh In

Beef Weigh-in will be SATURDAY February 10th, from 8:00 AM to 10:00 AM.

Any market beef cattle who may be showing at the KCC fair, or will be nominated for the Colorado State Fair, must weigh in during those times in order to be eligible to show at either fair. CATTLE MUST BE BROKE TO LEAD ACROSS SCALES. This is due to safety concerns, and wear and tear on the scale equipment. Cattle that cannot be led across will not be weighed in

There will be 163 days between weigh-in and fair. Weight ranges have changed for 2024 at fair. All Market Heifers and Steers must weigh 1,000 to 1,600 pounds. No minimum rate of gain requirement for the livestock sale at fair, but this weight will be used to determine the animal's rate of gain.

Cost is \$5 per animal (for tags and scale certification and scale repairs) If you do not have a brand inspection for your calves it can be done at weigh in as well.

Junior Superintendents

4-H or FFA members 12 years and up, who are interested in being Junior Superintendents for the 2024 KCC Fair need to contact the Extension office and apply by February 1st. We ask that junior livestock superintendents not apply for a species they intend to show at the fair.


